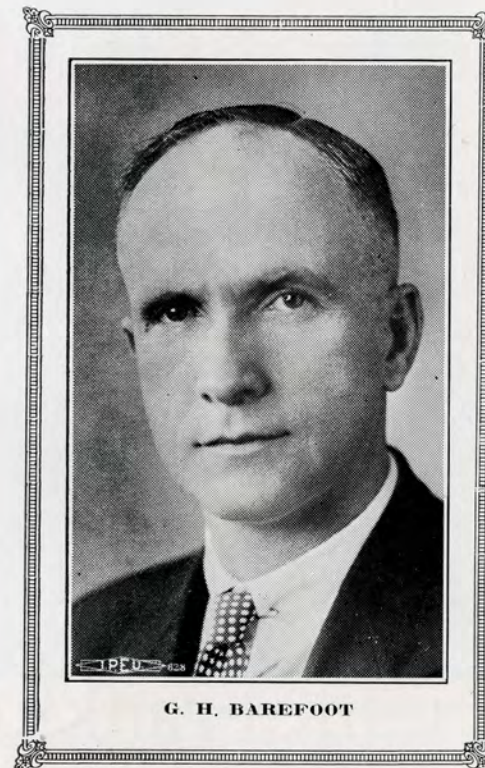

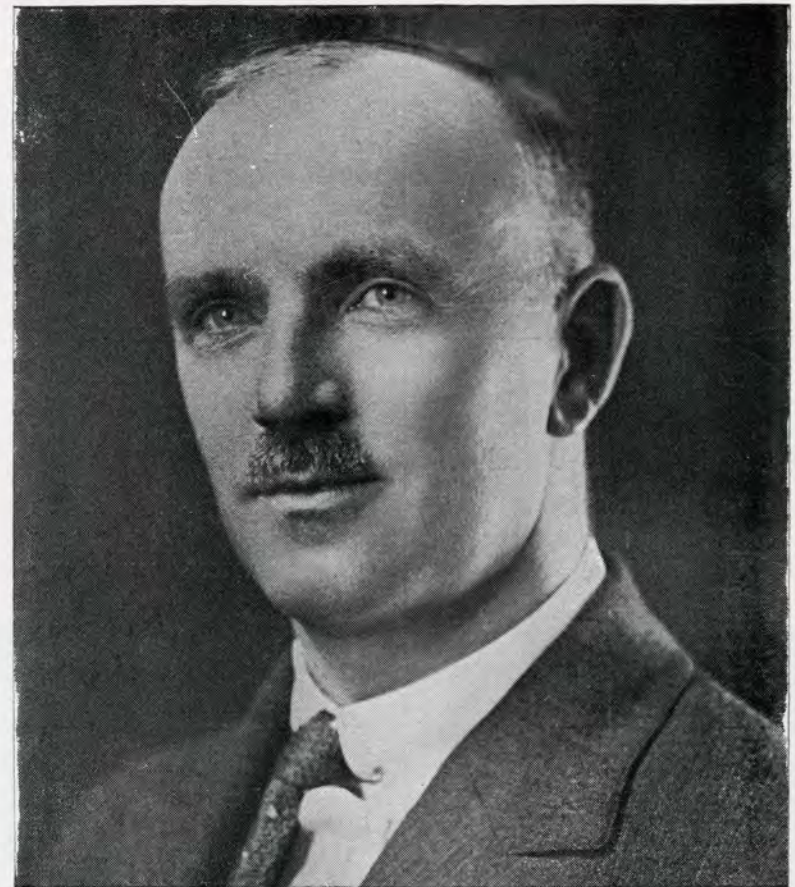

Davis, E. D. Alyea, R. Shepherd, Board of Directors. Branch Presidents: A. Palmer, 1922-23-24; H. N. C. Davis, 1925-26-27; W. C. S. Lane, 1928-29; W. H. Gray, 1930-31; W. A. Griggs, 1932-33, May, 1933, transferred to Vancouver; E. Bailey, 1933-34; S. E. Gunn, 1935, January transferred to Kingsgate, B.C.; W. C. S. Lane, 1935, November resigned; G. A. Thomas, November and December, 1935; F. Trainer, 1936.

Dominion Representatives: A. Palmer, 1922-23-24-25; T. B. Chettle, 1926-27-28-29-30-31; F. Trainer, 1932-33-34-35-36. A. Palmer, T. B. Chettle, and F. Trainer have also held office as Dominion 1st Vice-President.

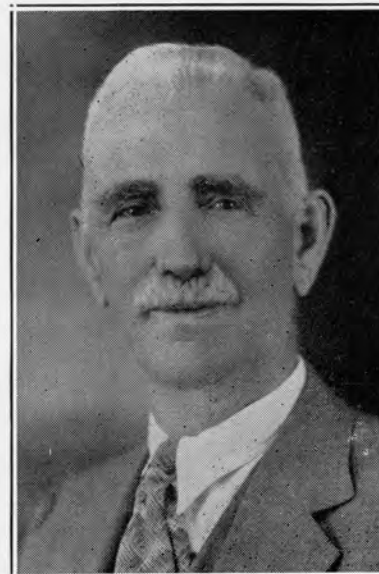

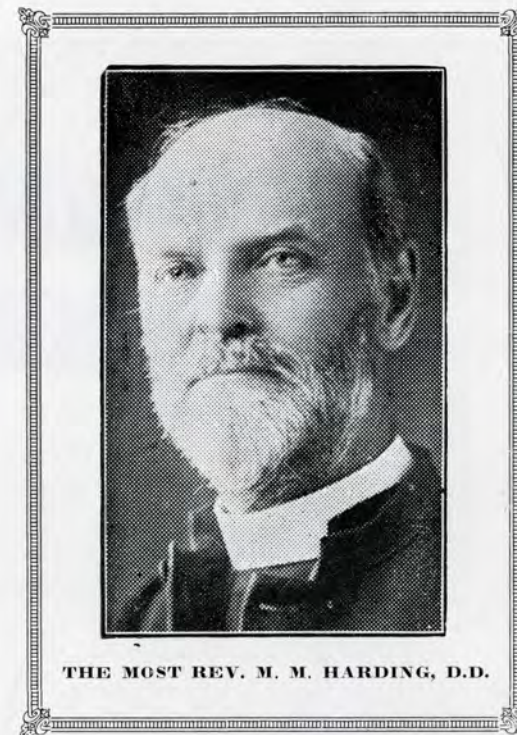

ERNEST A. ROWE
Winnipeg, Manitoba

Ernie, as he is known to his friends, was born in Buckinghamshire, England, on April 7th, 1888, and came to Canada in March, 1911. On hearing the call to arms he enlisted in the 44th Battalion at the London Block, Main Street, Winnipeg, on September 27th, 1915. He accompanied this Battalion overseas to Bramshott, England, in October, 1915. Transferred to the 27th "City of Winnipeg" Battalion, then in France, in April, 1916. Was severely wounded in the Ypres Salient on May 28th, 1916, suffering the loss of both his legs, during the heavy fighting at that time. Was invalided back to Canada in July, 1917.

Is of an especially cheerful nature despite his severe handicap, and is the proud father of two strapping boys. A member of the old "Fragments Club" in 1919, was one of the first to join this Association on its formation, and is usually present at all meetings and functions of the Branch, where his happy smile and cheerful word are always more than welcome.

The Amputations' Association of the Great War

The Amputations' Association of the Great War, "Fragments from France," was established May 11th, 1920, under the authority of a Dominion Charter, with the following objects:

(a) To bind together in a spirit of fraternity all men and women who have lost a limb or limbs, or complete eyesight, whilst giving their services to Canada, the British Empire, and the Allies, in the Great War, and to inculcate a spirit of loyalty to Canada and the Empire.

(b) To advance the interests of its members by securing employment, pensions, orthopaedic appliances, and to such action, directly or indirectly, as shall be calculated to advance the material, financial, moral and economic interests of the members of the Association, whether individually or collectively.

(c) To carry on with its aims and objects, solely as a non-political, non-partisan and non-sectarian association.

At the time of incorporation there were in existence the original branch of the Amputations' Association of the Great War, Toronto; the Fragment Club of Winnipeg; the Amputation Section of the Great War Veterans' Association in Calgary and Edmonton, and a similar organization in Vancouver.

The first Dominion Convention was held September, 1921, at the headquarters of the Association, 7 College Street, Toronto; Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Hamilton, Halifax and Toronto sending delegates. A Dominion executive representative of all sections of the country was elected. Captain Rev. S. E. Lambert, O.B.E., was made President, a position he has held ever since, and Arnold Sutcliffe, Secretary-Treasurer. A per capita tax was arranged for. Many important resolutions in conformity with the aims and objects of the Association were endorsed. A. Palmer and J. Graham represented this Branch at this first Convention. Authorization was given to hold the second convention in Vancouver, September, 1922.

Active membership is permissible, providing otherwise eligible, to any man or woman of good character who has lost a limb or limbs or complete eyesight in the services of Canada, the British Empire and the Allies when such Allies are at the time of application British subjects, during the period of the Great War, 1914, or a member of the British forces in any former war of the Empire. The first Convention recorded a total membership of 800 members, while at the last Convention held in Edmonton, September, 1935, a membership of well over 1,800 was recorded.

Dominion Conventions have been held in the following cities: Toronto, 1921 and 1931; Vancouver, 1922 and 1932; Ottawa, 1924 and 1934; Winnipeg, 1925 and 1936; Calgary, 1926; Hamilton, 1927; Victoria, 1928; Montreal, 1929; Regina, 1930, and Edmonton, 1935. Delegates to the Conventions are elected by the Branches according to membership. All Conventions are open and members and their families are invited to attend. Apart from the business of the Convention, the re-union feature plays an important part. Hospital days are recalled and the bond of a common handicap cements a great fraternity. Registration at conventions has always been of a most representative character, and in the case of the Toronto Convention (1931) in excess of 1,400. Branches have been established and are operating in the following cities: Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatchewan at Regina, Manitoba at Winnipeg, London, Hamilton, Toronto, Kingston, Ottawa, Montreal, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island at Halifax, New Brunswick at St. John.

Dominion Headquarters of the Association are established at 62 St. Albans Street, Toronto, with the following Dominion officers: Capt. Rev. S. E. Lambert, O.B.E., President; R. Myers, Hon. Secretary; C. J. Brown, Hon. Treasurer, and E. A. Baker, O.B.E., M.C., Dominion Executive member; F. Trainer, Winnipeg, 1st Vice-President, and Robt. Wilson, Toronto, 2nd Vice-President.

Acting under Convention and Dominion Executive authority the affairs of the Association have functioned to the fullest advantage. Upward revision of pension ratings ranging from 5 to 20 per cent. has been secured for most amputations. Special allowance for wear and tear of clothing due to the use of orthopaedic appliances have been obtained. Constant pressure is exercised for the latest improvements in orthopaedic appliances, resulting in Government issue of the best type of appliances available on this continent. Following the great publicity campaign and drive in 1924 by the Association, Parliament stabilized pensions. The pension bonus was then incorporated in all pensions. This affected every disabled soldier pensioner in Canada and every pensionable widow. Legislation has been promoted broadening many provisions of the Pension Act, including wider provision for widows' pensions. The Association has stood firmly for the humanizing of pension machinery and many trying and complicated situations have been faced and met. An efficient pension adjustment is carried on. Employment for many of our members has been secured in Dominion, Provincial and Municipal services as well as employment with private employers.



THOMAS B. CHETTLE

Born at Bangor, County Down, Ireland, August 12th, 1894, where he received his early education. Came to Canada in 1910, making Winnipeg his home. Employed by Gault's Limited until the fall of 1914. Enlisted with the 27th (City of Winnipeg) Battalion on October 27th, 1914, and served overseas with that unit as a signaller until October 11th, 1918, when he was severely wounded, which necessitated the loss of his right leg at the thigh. Was decorated with the Military Medal in the strenuous days when fighting was hottest around Cambria in 1918. Was elected as a member of the Dominion Executive at Calgary in 1926 and as Dominion 2nd Vice-President at Hamilton in 1927, which position he held until his election as Dominion 1st Vice-President at Montreal in 1929. Is a chartered member of the Manitoba Branch and has acted as Branch Secretary-Treasurer since 1921, and since 1929 has carried the added duties of Club Manager. Was the recipient of the King's Jubilee Medal last year for his services to ex-service men and their dependents since his discharge from the Army. Married Miss Agnes MacKay, June 6th, 1923, and is the proud father of a boy and girl (twins), born 1924.

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SCENES IN MIDWEST CANADA'S MINING FIELDS

Midwest Canada's mining fields extend over approximately 2,000,000 square miles of rough, rocky country, broken by a maze of lakes and streams. Serious exploration for metals has been attempted during the past ten years. It that time over 25 mines—some large and some small—have been brought into production. Numerous other finds have as yet not been developed.

In recent years production has rapidly mounted, and in 1935 the aggregate value of the gold, silver, copper, zinc, cadmium, selenium, tellurium, and radium produced amounted to \$19,700,000. Six years ago the value of metallic output was less than \$1,000,000 annually, so that the 20-fold increase in recent years does offer an interesting evidence of the progress achieved.



A. PALMER

Born in Lancashire, England, February, 2nd, 1886. Came to Canada and settled in Winnipeg in 1906. Returned to England and was married in 1907. Returned to Canada a short time later.

Enlisted with 45th Battalion, C.E.F., at Portage la Prairie, 1915. Drafted to 28th Battalion in Belgium in 1916. Suffered the loss of his right leg through gun-shot wounds received during the Battle of Vimy Ridge, April 9th, 1917.

Is a chartered member of the Manitoba Branch, and was among the first twenty-six who formed the "Fragments Club" in Winnipeg. Has occupied the office of President of the Branch on several occasions. Represented the Branch before the "Ralston Royal Commission" in 1924, also the first veterans' council in Winnipeg. With other Dominion representatives, he represented this Branch before the Senate Committee when the "Bonus on Pensions" was under discussion at Ottawa.

Owing to ill-health left Winnipeg to reside in Victoria, British Columbia, in 1926, where he still is resident. Has continued his work on behalf of ex-service men and their dependents in Victoria, and has occupied the office of President of the Victoria Branch, as well as being on the Executive body of that Branch up to the present year. Is

now Secretary-Treasurer of the Provincial Command of the Amputations' Association in British Columbia. Appointed this year by the Provincial Government of British Columbia to the Commission administering "The Education of Soldiers' Dependent Children Act." Was the recipient of the King's Jubilee Medal for services rendered to his fellow comrades.

The Winnipeg Grain Exchange

THE WINNIPEG GRAIN EXCHANGE is a market place where the buyers and sellers of grain meet to transact their business and where arrangements are made to place Canadian grain and its products into the consuming markets of the world as rapidly as possible and with the minimum of cost to all concerned.

The Exchange does not itself engage in trading; its function is to supply the facilities and organization by which its members move Canada's grain from the farm lands of the West to the four corners of the world.

The members of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange represent every division of the grain business from the grower to the consumer—elevator operators, commission merchants, brokers, shippers, vessel brokers, millers. The members resident in Winnipeg number about 360. The non-resident members to the number of more than 100 reside in Great Britain, the United States and European countries.

The growth of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange has kept pace with the growth of the West. It has become an international grain market of first importance; it is in constant touch by wire, cable and telephone with the grain centres of the world.

The Council and members of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange welcome the members of the Dominion Convention of the Amputations' Association of the Great War to the city. They trust that their stay here will be enjoyable and that their discussions will result advantageously to themselves.

A cordial invitation is extended to all the delegates to visit the Exchange Trading Floor and acquaint themselves with the facilities for grain marketing provided there.

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Historical

WINNIPEG—situated at the junction of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers, is the largest city in Central Canada, and one of the four metropolitan cities of the Dominion. It is the geographical centre of the North American continent and the gateway to a vast recreation and scenic territory of sunshine and health. Some sixty years ago, the small frontier settlement of Fort Garry, with its 1,870 inhabitants, was incorporated as a city and the name changed to Winnipeg.

The history of Winnipeg and the Province of Manitoba, of which it is the capital, is interesting. About 1735, that intrepid French-Canadian explorer, Pierre de La Verendrye, in seeking a "North-West Passage," journeyed from Quebec to Lake Winnipeg and the Red River, establishing numerous trading posts en route. La Verendrye was, therefore, the first white man, of

whom there is any authentic record, to visit the site where Winnipeg now stands. In later years, he was followed by officials of the Hudson's Bay Company, who came down from the north by way of Hudson Bay, the Nelson River and Lake Winnipeg. Lord Selkirk, a Scottish nobleman, followed in August, 1812, and colonized a considerable section of the country lying along the Red River. These early pioneers were known as the "Selkirk Settlers."

INDUSTRIAL

Winnipeg possesses all the important factors necessary for the successful carrying on of diversified manufacturing and in consequence occupies a prominent place in the industrial activities of Canada. It is the gateway to Manitoba's mining areas. It is noted for its hydro-electric power, the cheapest in North America, developed by several very extensive modern plants of City Hydro-Electric System and the Winnipeg Electric Co., located on the Winnipeg River.

It has the largest stock yards within the British Empire—numerous flour and grist mills—large packing plants, steel and iron works—breweries and bakeries, and many other industries engaged in the manufacture of innumerable products.

CONVENTIONS

Winnipeg is known far and wide as "Canada's Central Convention City." Many gatherings of a national, international, and regional character have been held here, and have added their meed of praise to Winnipeg as being one of the outstanding convention cities of America. Contributing to these advantages are its accessibility by rail, highways and air routes, its adequate and splendid hotel accommodation, and unrivalled opportunities for sport and entertainment. Its auditorium, costing over a million dollars, is the finest of its kind in Canada, and is suitable for any size convention.

HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS

Winnipeg has over 50 hotels, varying in size from palatial hostleries to the smaller suburban inns, and prices are ranged to suit every purse. Winnipeg's Class "A" restaurants are also of an exceptionally high standard.

RESORTS

Many attractive and interesting summer resorts, within easy distance of Winnipeg, offer healthful recreation in the great outdoors of sunshine and exhilarating air. There is the Riding Mountain National Park, one of the finest in Canada; Winnipeg Beach, Sans Souci Park, Victoria Beach, Grand Beach, Berens River and Norway House on Lake Winnipeg; Delta Beach on Lake Manitoba; the Whiteshell Forest Reserve; Kenora on the Lake of the Woods, and Minaki on the Winnipeg River.

PARKS AND DRIVES

Throughout Winnipeg's beautiful residential section and tree-lined streets are many delightful drives, and no less than 38 public parks and squares, ranging in size up to 290 acres. The drive along both sides of the Red River to St. Andrews Locks, Lower Fort Garry and Selkirk is particularly enjoyable.

MONUMENTS AND HISTORICAL POINTS

Throughout Winnipeg and its suburbs are numerous monuments and historical features, among which may be mentioned Lower Fort Garry, the Cenotaph, Old Fort Garry Gate, Seven Oaks Monument, Fort Osborne Barracks, "Countess of Dufferin," first locomotive in Western Canada, the Trappist Monastery, and the historical exhibit of the Hudson's Bay Company.

WINTER SPORTS

Winnipeg has an enviable reputation for Winter Sports. The Annual Bonspiel is the largest curling event of its kind in the world. Many badminton clubs, skating and hockey rinks, ski jumps and toboggan slides flourish during the season. Bowling and snowshoeing are also popular pastimes; and the Annual Skating Carnival is a colorful and magnificent spectacle.

TRANSPORTATION

Winnipeg is accessible by many railways, numerous bus lines, waterways and air routes, and all-weather highways centre on Winnipeg from all directions.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Winnipeg's many fine public buildings are worth visiting. Among these may be mentioned the Parliament Building, Grain Exchange, Auditorium, Federal Building, Amphitheatre, Hospitals, Minto Armoury, City Hall, University of Manitoba, Law Courts, Mounted Police Barracks, various colleges and convents, many schools and churches, municipal swimming pools, and last but not least, the beautiful cathedral in the sister city of St. Boniface.

SHOPPING DISTRICT

On the wide and splendid arteries of traffic within the main business section of the city—Main Street and Portage Avenue—will be found the principal retail shopping district. Modern and palatial stores, metropolitan daily newspapers, theatres, picture houses, etc., offer the visitor the best of everything in their particular line.

SPORTS AND PASTIMES

Many fine playing grounds are utilized for almost every known land sport, and the waters of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers afford canoeing, swimming, boating and fishing. Winnipeg has no less than eighteen golf courses, two of which are municipal ones. Two of the finest race tracks on this continent—Polo Park and Whittier Park—hold meets of two weeks' duration each, extending from the latter part of May to the beginning of July each summer.

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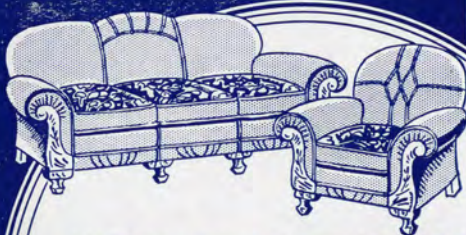
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
